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


the table on 22 points and therefore not yet guaranteed 1st Division football in 2012/13. They still needed a point...

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
Monthly Golf

Historical Walk












Eleven of us joined the historical hike in Shau Kei Wan with Jason Wordie.

As in previous years, the Swiss Association had a team at the Dragon Boat Festival 2012 in Stanley.





On a Sunday in September a total of 27 members and friends went wall climbing at the YMCA. The group was a nice mix of children, parents and young adults.

After the instructions by the YMCA staff and some good warm-up we all started to take turns on climbing the wall. We were very enthusiastic and eager to climb all the different wall levels. With some kids, it looked like a walk in the park, while most adults where happy to take it slow on turns. Nevertheless, a few managed the most difficult wall for that day. Some parents who thought they would only be spectators, even got encouraged to give it a try. It was good fun!







After a very long bad weather period, not too many members dared to sign in for the Shek O Beach BBQ and some of those who signed in had meanwhile other plans as they were sure the event would be canceled. Those who did not come will not know what they have missed. Not the best but definitely warm weather, great company and wonderful food to share made this event even with not too many participants a wonderful day. The kids were busy swimming and running around the beach while the adults tasted the wonderful wines sponsored by Finessa Ltd.

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On a rainy grey Saturday morning, 5th of May 2012 a small group of 14 people met at the busy and crowded TST MTR station. From here it was a mere few steps into Chungking mansions maze of shops, stalls and smells, awash with people from all continents. We queued up for the small and stuffy lift which brought us up to the top floor, where Christian Action has its offices and Daniel Burns awaited us.

The NGO is spread out over 2 floors with offices, classrooms, lounge with TV and a canteen for meals.

HongKong government has not ratified the 1951 UN Refugee Convention, only ratified the Convention against Torture, thus all asylum seekers or refugees with no HK ID that do not fall under the 'Convention against Torture' are not receiving any assistance or help and basically live in the streets with no food or shelter.

This is where amongst other NGOs, Christian Action (CA) comes in to help. The staff at CA will evaluate who seems entitled to receive aid and CA will provide the bare necessities such as pay for shelter, provide 3 meals a day, seek to place kids in schools and pay school money. Furthermore CA provides various activities in-house, from















teaching Cantonese to sewing, playing music together (a CD is in production and available soon so we are told by Daniel) so as to give the clients a structure in their day and provide them with some skills they may need. For the younger kids a playgroup exists. Here a true global village comes together in the smallest of space; during our brief visit we met a family from Sri Lanka and Yemen and shared our curry lunch with men from Togo and Cote d'Ivoire amongst others. Their stories of hardship, despair and escape are now filled with a little hope for a new future in Hong Kong, which they may have, thanks to the help of Christian Action.

The volunteers and staff of CA are truly inspiring. A grey-haired 'granny' served lunch instead of sitting at home in front of the TV all day, it was heartwarming, she is one of the many others who work and volunteer here in helping people in need. CA receives donations mainly from churches, community groups, trusts and associations, companies and individuals.

We left after lunch with many thoughts in our minds. One of them is if you can, please donate, not just money but goods; very welcome are electrical goods such as rice-cookers, water kettle, microwave, fridge, kitchen tools or clothing.



boy, Dimitri, who was well ahead in the faster group, was already gobbling fried rice at Rainbow in Sok Kwu Wan....



Guest Speaker: Mr Dieter Kaeslin, VP, Capital Markets, SunGard



One of the common themes amongst the news reports, investigations, regulations, and guidelines that have been published since the global financial crisis is the need to build a risk-aware culture within our financial institutions.



April 2012: "Where is the world heading? A financial outlook"

Guest Speaker: Mr Pranay Gupta, Chief Investment Officer Asia, Global Head of Investment Solutions, Lombard Odier & Cie

Pranay Gupta has been with Lombard Odier & Cie since 2012 and leads all the investment efforts in the Asia Pacific region. Prior to this he was Chief Investment Officer Asia-Pacific at ING Investment Management, responsible for overseeing USD 85bn in institutional, retail and insurance assets across eleven countries in Asia. Pranay Gupta is also the co-founder of the Global Association of Alternative Investors (GAAI), a global not-for-profit investment think tank of investment professionals from sovereign wealth funds, university endowments, and corporate and government pension plans from across the world. Pranay Gupta talked about the situation around the alobe over the next 18 months.



May 2012: "Lloyd's of London / The insurance market silly not the bank – what is it really?"
Guest Speaker: Mr David Herratt, CEO Swiss Insurance Partners Hong Kong

David Herratt has over 30 years of experience in the insurance industry in Europe, the Middle East and Asia. He is a consultant and advisor for Asia to Hampden Agencies Limited, a specialist Lloyd's of London Members' Agency, and has held executive positions with Lloyd's of London before, amongst others. David Herratt is a Fellow of the Chartered Insurance Institute (FCII) and a Fellow of the Institute of Risk Management (FIRM). David Herratt told us more about Lloyd's, how it came into being, how the business model has changed since the 17th century and in what respects it is still the same today, capitalised by private capital and new corporate capital.



June 2012: "Swiss Financial Center – Challenges and Opportunities"

Guest Speaker: Mr Patrick Odier, Chairman of the Swiss Bankers Association

Patrick Odier has been the chairman of the Swiss Bankers Association (SBA) since September 2009. Currently, he is also a Senior Partner of Lombard Odier Darier Hentsch & Cie based in Geneva. Patrick Odier is a board member of several Swiss and international academic institutions and non-profit organizations, as well as the Vice-Chairman of Economiesuisse. Patrick Odier holds a degree in economics from the University of Geneva and an MBA in finance from the University of Chicago. Patrick Odier provided us with a brief summary on the current challenges the Swiss financial center is facing. The second part of his speech was dedicated to some new business opportunities that could provide future growth for Swiss banks.



September 2012: "How the Hong Kong – Macau – Zhuhai Bridge project will impact the economy in Hong Kong and the Pearl River Delta"

Guest Speaker: Mr Peter Lau Ka-keung, Director of Highway, Transport and Housing Bureau

Peter Lau Ka-keung has been the director of highways since September 2010. Before that, he was the Director of Drainage Services. Peter Lau Ka-keung presented the bridge project to us. We heard from him details on the project itself and on the expected socio-economic impact on Hong Kong and the Pearl River Delta at large.



October 2012: "How have implants changed restorative dentistry?"

Guest Speaker: Prof. Dr. Niklaus P. Lang, University of Hong Kong

Niklaus Lang is Professor of Implant Dentistry at the University of Hong Kong, Professor Emeritus, University of Berne, Chairman 1980-2008. He holds four honorary doctorates and published over 500 articles in peer-reviewed journals and several textbooks. He presented over 2500 lectures in five continents. A generation ago, complex cases either ended up in being treated with full dentures or with elaborate prosthetic reconstructions on few teeth with reduced periodontal support. In the latest two decades, oral implants have revolutionized reconstructive dentistry.



November 2012: "Where has the "Lion Rock" Spirit Gone?"

Guest Speaker: Mr Lam Woon Kwong, GBS, JP Chairperson, Equal Opportunities Commission

Lam Woon Kwong was appointed as the Chairperson of Equal Opportunities Commission in February 2010. Prior to joining the EOC, Lam Woon Kwong has worked in various government policy bureaux and departments, including the then Education and Manpower Branch, Department of Education, and Civil Service Bureau. He was Secretary for Home Affairs, Director of the Chief Executive's Office. and the Chief Executive Officer of the Olympic Equestrian Events (Hong Kong). Since 1 July 2012, he has been appointed as Convener of Non-Official Members of the Executive Council. Hong Kong went through its "Period of Enlightenment" back in the 1970s and early 80s. Now, we are much richer and more sophisticated, yet many seem to despair and look to the future with doubt and aloom.



November 2012: "A Luncheon in the Presence of Messrs Jean-Pierre Roth and Blaise Goetschin"

Mr Jean-Pierre Roth is chairman of the board of directors of Banque Cantonale de Genève and former president of the Swiss National Bank (2001-2009) as well as former governor of the International Monetary Fund (for Switzerland). Jean-Pierre Roth is also a member of the council of the Geneva Chamber of Commerce and Industry. Mr Blaise Goetschin is CEO of Banque Cantonale de Genève, member of the board of the Swiss Bankers Association and member of the council of the Geneva Chamber of Commerce and Industry.



December 2012: "Child's Dream – Education for All"

Guest Speaker: Mr Daniel M. Siegfried, one of the two founders of Child's Dream and Ms Manuela C. Bianchi, Chief Operating Officer

Child's Dream is a charitable, not-for-profit organisation dedicated to empowering marginalised children and youth in the Mekong Sub-Region. Daniel M. Siegfried and Manuela C. Bianchi have both previously lived and worked in Hong Kong. They spoke about health interventions to reduce child mortality, the construction of educational facilities to provide universal basic education, youth employment centers, high school and university scholarships.
