Organisation of the Swiss Abroad

Interview with our new President, Alexandre Tunik

How long have you been in Hong Kong?

I came to Hong Kong 23 years ago, straight after University. Against all odds, (or at least that was the consulate's view at the time – "Sie haehn ja kreine Arbitsbewilligig") I found a job within 3 weeks of landing. Two and half years later, I decided to leverage on the opportunities available in China and my South American contacts to launch my own Export business. This business evolved into a manufacturing business. My Chinese business partner and I own two factories in Fujian province. We manufacture swimwear and winter gear for the likes of Gant, Bogner, Woolrich, Triumph, Sloggi, HOM, Descente, Arenea, etc. I am in the process of opening a new factory in Ganzhou, in Jiangxi Province.

What motivated you to run for the OSA presidency?

An ex-SAHK president, President of the HSG alumni and active member of the Swiss Chamber of Commerce, I like to keep a link to Switzerland and the Swiss community. After over 20 years in Hong Kong, I felt it was a good time to get involved with OSA and give something back.

Can you tell our readers about the OSA Congress, which took place in August?

The OSA Congress is held over two days. The first day is the Council of the Swiss Abroad during which the board discuss issues pertaining to the Swiss living abroad. The main issues discussed remained as in previous years: e-voting (which is canton-dependent), possibilities for Swiss living abroad to keep a bank account in Switzerland to enable pension matters and the much talked about law governing the Swiss abroad.

The second day focused on the theme "Switzerland and Globalisation". Different projects were discussed and an interesting presentation was given about Switzerland as an Innovations centre, rather than a workplace or financial centre.

What do you think are the most important themes for OSA in Hong Kong?

Aside from the e-voting issues and the law governing the Swiss abroad, I believe the issue of allowing Swiss students who studied abroad access to Swiss education to be a key topic.

What will your focus be for OSA during your term of office?

Being actively involved with the HSG, I think that I will look into the education issue.. It is not necessarily easy and straight forward for Swiss Children who have studied abroad to get into Swiss Universities if they did not passed the Swiss "Matura".

OSA's role:

Inform: OSA informs Swiss living abroad about Switzerland and current news

Link: OSA is committed to creating a strong link between Swiss expatriates and their home country. OSA offers a wide range of services to fulfil this aim.

Defend: OSA represents and protects the interests of over 700,000 Swiss living abroad.

Advise: OSA offers free advice to Swiss expatriates and any Swiss person wishing to return to Switzerland.

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Spotlight: "I say fondue, you say hotpot"

At first glance, there doesn't seem to be much in common between Cantonese and Swiss food. There really doesn't seem a place where Hoisin and Tartare sauce can meet. Not quite so, I say, for have you ever gone to one of Hong Kong's Swiss restaurants for a fonude or for a typically Cantonese hotpot? Or even better, have you ever had a Fondue Chinoise in Switzerland? Let me explain...

Traditionally, Swiss fondue is a combination of cheeses (the type depends on the region you hail from) melted together in a pot with a healthy dose of garlic, white wine and kirsch, if you so fancy. Although the origins of fondue can be traced back to Homer's Iliad in 800BC to 725BC, its modern day adaptation as described above hails from the Rhone-Alpes region, where it first made an appearance in the 1800s. It is however only in the 1930s that the Swiss Cheese Union declared it a National Dish.

So what, you now ask, does this have to do with hotpot? Legend has it, a Swiss man visiting China had been served a dish similar to fondue using broth instead of cheese, a hotpot! Upon his return, his story inspired Swiss chefs to create "Fondue Chinoise", a dish in which thinly sliced strips of high quality beef, pork or veal are served raw to be cooked in a communal pot filled with broth, and then dipped in an array of dipping sauces. Raw fish and shrimp are also steamed in the pot using metal baskets. Does that remind you of something?

Whilst I agree that the Chinese hotpot and Swiss Fondue Chinoise, if one might call it that, don't have much in common except a broth and a common pot for cooking things in, fondue and/or hotpot are not just about the actual food. They are hearty dishes shared around a table with good friends, the essence of what we might call conviviality. And maybe this, more than the broth or the different types of meats, is what Cantonese and Swiss people share the most: their love of socialising with friends and family around good food.

Ginger soy: light soy sauce, minced ginger and a few drops of sesame oil Chinese mustard: light soy sauce, mustard, peanut oil, tsp salt and a few drops of vinegar. Hoisin sauce: hoisin sauce, ketchup, vinegar, 1tsp sugar and soy sauce.


Fondue Chinoise

- Cocktail sauce: mayonnaise, ketchup, cognac, Tabasco, lemon, salt and pepper
- Tartare sauce: mayonnaise, chopped boiled egg, chopped cornichons (type of gherkin), parsley, pepper
- Curry sauce: mayonnaise, curry powder, salt and pepper, a little lemon juice

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Swiss Rifle Association of Hong Kong – Going Strong

Shooting with our adapted Swiss army rifle continues to be an exclusive activity in Hong Kong. Some 50 registered members have an opportunity twice a year to come to a friendly shooting competition at a 50-meter shooting range in Sheng Shui.

In spring we shoot the Swiss army compulsory and field shoot (Obligatorisches und Feldschiessen) and in the fall a traditional program, which since its inception over 30 years ago goes under the name Operation Mercury. On each of the two days each shooter fires over 60 rounds - between a game of Jass, or a Bratwurst and Cheese.

Our traditional club is open to all Swiss army trained residents of Hong Kong. For people that were trained on the old army rifle Stgw57 we provide an introduction and refresher course.

The Swiss government provides rifles and ammo through its "Schiesswesen Ausland" Section in Berne. Rifles are on long-term loan, and stored at a secure armory managed by a private Hong Kong arms dealer. The same goes for ammunition,

which due to limited local storage capacity, needs to be imported from Switzerland every 18 months or so. This is an established routine involving the preparation of numerous documents, until the cases find their place in a Swiss airliner for a flight to Hong Kong. Here, our ammo is picked up and transported under police escort from the airport to a private armory.

All of this activity follows strict regulations, and is overseen by the Hong Kong Police Force, who continues to be a great supporter of our activities. For more information and how to join look up SRAHK on Facebook.



Historical Walk through Central

How much can you learn about Hong Kong and its history in just one hour? Much more than you could possibly imagine!

Our journey began in front of the HSBC building. From there we walked over to Statue Square and the Legislative Council Building, turned back to Queen's Road and finished in front of St. John's Cathedral. Meanwhile, we learned about Hong Kong's beginning as a military outpost, discovered where the original shoreline ran, and followed the city's development and growth to present times. On the way, we saw traces of the Japanese invasion during World War II (hint: look at the back side of the HSBC lions) and compared old and new Hong Kong. Mr. Wordie made history come alive, explaining the land reclamation scheme, showing us the different stages of development in Central with old paintings and pictures and explaining how some of the streets we walk along every day got their names, like Ice House Street or Battery Path.

Historical Walk through Tsim Sha Tsui

Although the weather forecast was not very encouraging, a wonderful group of 18 people met in front of the old Kowloon-Canton Railway clock tower in TST on Saturday morning to start the walk in search of the traces of old Kowloon. Led by Mr. Wordie, we journeyed through time from the city's beginning to its actual manifestation, covering some very interesting facts.

Did you know, that once upon a time the fastest way to Europe from Hong Kong was over land, via Bejing, Manchuria and Moscow, using the Trans-Siberian Express?

What happened to most of the trees in Hong Kong during World War II? What was the round building with a big metal ball on top in front of 1881 Heritage used for? And that is has a twin on top of Signal Hill? That there are several buildings made of English brick in Hong Kong, as using it was a means of supporting this industry during a severe crisis? That quite a few buildings in San Francisco are made of stone quarried in Kowloon? That the red spots

on walls and floors of Chungking Mansion are not blood but betel leaf juice?

Historical Walk through Kowloon City

On a lovely Saturday morning a group of 17 enthusiastic people met up with historian Jason Wordie at Lok Fu MTR station, from where we walked to Kowloon Walled City Park. Along the

way, we learned about HK government's housing policies, which are reflected in the different styles of public housing built over the years and which we saw on our walk.

Kowloon City, near the old Kai Tak Airport, has a rich and varied history, especially the area that used to be a no-man's-land: Kowloon Walled City, a high-rise slum now converted into a lovely park. Right in the middle of the park, the old buildings, which used to house the old magistrate are now a museum bearing testimony to a by-gone era where drug-runners and illegal gambling dens shared the space with small factories, restaurants and even dentists!

Civil Aviation Tour

On November 21st we had the opportunity to visit the recently relocated Airport Air Traffic Control Complex (ATC) for an insider's view. The Complex recently relocated from midfield to a location near the Dragonair house outside the security parameter of the airport.

Welcomed by CAD-employees, (CAD stands for Civil Aviation Department), the Swiss Association group signed up for this fully booked event met in the main lobby of the ATC's brand new building.

After a brief summary of Chek Lap Kok airport's history relating to Air Traffic Control (ATC) we learned about the new Civil Aviation Department buildings' features. The new complex incorporates a main and a slightly separate backup building. The latter is to be used as a back-up building should there be an emergency (fire, electric breakdown, etc...) in the main building. ATC will be able to transfer to the alternate building to provide control of Hong Kong's airspace and HKIA. At the moment, ATC is still using the "old" facility located within the building underneath the midfield control tower for area and approach control. The new facility is planned to be operational at the latest by the end of 2014.

Continuing along the educational path we learned about airport security, baggage scanning, dangerous goods and some aircraft equipment like a mock-up of a cabin section introducing a passenger seat airbag system.

After the initial more general subjects, our tour continued to the more ATC specific part passing a viewing window of the future air traffic control room, noise insulated for minimum distractions of the respective controllers at work. The new state-of-the-art workstations will allow the controllers to safely direct the 276,000 square km large area.

This concluded the tour, which from now on, unlike past visits, will unfortunately exclude the visit of the actual control tower.

Since the tour was finished in just over an hour, some of the group joined a spontaneous visit to the Cathay headquarters. This completed the insiders' tour of Hong Kong's aviation.



According to Ms. Tutuianu, the outlook is robust for those who know how to adapt accordingly.

Swiss School Committee



The Swiss School Committee has been a subcommittee of the Swiss Association of Hong Kong (SAHK) since 1978, and, therefore, is completely independent from the schools. Presently, we are a team of six members. By reporting to the Swiss Government and the SAHK, we provide a platform to support Swiss teachers, Swiss students and their parents, and the Swiss community. We help newly arrived families as well as departing families with their educational enquiries.

Switzerland is supportive of Swiss educational options abroad and here in Hong Kong, these are the German Swiss International School (GSIS) and the French International School (FIS), which give our Swiss students the opportunity to study in their mother tongues. To safeguard the educational and cultural interests of Swiss citizens, government support is currently not given directly to GSIS or FIS, but instead, it is through partially sponsoring Swiss teachers at the respective schools. Presently there are three sponsored Swiss teachers at GSIS and one at FIS.

What we do

Reflective of the Swiss social spirit, the Swiss government requires active participation from the Swiss business community here in Hong Kong. This is where the Swiss School Committee comes into play and organizes the fundraising, manages the Swiss funds and liaises between the Swiss government and GSIS / FIS. A yearly fundraising effort aims to cover part of the costs of the Swiss teachers, the other part being sponsored by the Swiss Federal Office of Culture.

In return, future Swiss students have priority status to enter the German Stream of GSIS and the French Stream of FIS - a considerable advantage, considering the long waiting lists at international schools in Hong Kong. To ensure this benefit is not lost in the future, it is imperative to gain the support of Swiss companies in Hong Kong!

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
